Dear friends

As we begin April this year we are drawing near to the end of Lent, celebrating Mothering Sunday (3<sup>rd</sup>) and then comes Palm Sunday (17th), Holy Week which includes Maundy Thursday (21st), Good Friday (22nd) and then comes Easter Day (24th). This month can be a strangely comforting and also challenging period of time in the year when we are made mindful of the degree of Jesus' love for the world, for you and me which words can never satisfactorily express. It is both an exciting and a joyful time as families enjoy coming together, when children and adults enjoy the fun and gifts of chocolate Easter Eggs. In the the empty Easter Egg carton and foil wrapping we might even see the miracle of the Tomb and Christ's resurrection but it's a beginning not an end! At Easter we think of the Risen Christ, new life and hope for our personal future and the future of all humanity. Because of all this and much more, the Church becomes a challenging and a comfortable place to which many come, although not always for reasons we can identify. Put simply, we have a need, a searching, a longing for something which is met to some extent as we come to Church on Palm Sunday, in Holy Week and at Easter. Easter is indeed a 'let's get back to church' sort of time for many who have been caught up in the business of life and who 'temporarily' forgot the place of God in their lives and the life of their family. However, our need is not met because we 'attend Church' or 'take Communion', it's met because fundamentally in coming back to Church we are like 'the Prodigal Son' in the Parable of Jesus, coming back home to our Father God.

In coming back, questions such as, 'and where do you think you've been until this time?' aren't asked! Statements such as, 'you use this place like a hotel!' aren't forthcoming. 'Late again!!' is not part of the welcome as we creep through the front door (or whispered) but what you will hear is 'It's great to see you', 'Come again, soon'. 'We've missed you' may be said but not to make you feel judged, just missed. The Attendance Register and the Clocking-in machine were buried in the Churchyard before pussy was a kitten! We also took out the turnstile and ticket prices have been halved (that's a joke by the way, we don't charge on entry, only on exit).

I hope I am not speaking out of turn but I am sure all who come regularly or once in a while to the URC Chapel and St Mary's Church won't mind if they turn up and find someone else sitting in the seat they habitually sit in. After all, they sit there probably because it's warmer or lighter or they can make a quick getaway.

If you are unsure about coming to Church or Chapel for the first time ever, say so when you come and we'll do our best to find you a seat near someone who won't look at you grumpily but will be happy to help you through the service if you're unsure. Remember I am very willing to see you at home if you've questions about the Church, faith or anything else you would like to talk to me about. Just pick up the phone and call 243863. God is with you.

## Sandon WI March meeting, 2011

Eileen Bartrup, President, welcomed members, two visitors, the Speaker Sally Kirk and her friend Pippa and thanked Thelma Stokes for the flowers, which were later sent to Margaret Gill who is unwell. Jerusalem was then sung, but later members agreed that it was better without a tape recording.

The Committee had decided to change the programme, and have the Speaker before tea so they did not have to stay through all the business part of the meeting, so Eileen then introduced Sally Kirk, who told us about her Spring Step Dairy. As a child, Sally longed to own a pony, and used to pray for this to happen. When her prayers were not answered she simply asked for something to do with animals, and having married a farmer she now has 700 goats, a puppy some alpacas and has had racehorses in the past! She and her husband used to be dairy farmers, but it proved so unprofitable that they sold up and took up goats, more entertaining, gentler and more delicate than cows. From the milk they make yoghurts, ice cream, double cream, cheese and also sell their milk, and Sally passed round samples of the milk. She also found herself with some alpacas whose wool is very fine, and can be used for either knitting or weaving up into material and the WI is planning a visit to Sally's farm in May. She was thanked by Dorothy Gray.

After tea, Eileen asked if members liked the new pattern of the meeting with the Speaker first, and it was agreed that it was a good idea. Rosemary Walden received her new member's book and we were reminded about the Group meeting on March 21st, and the County Annual meeting tomorrow, and the Inter W.I quiz will be on May 3rd at Boreham Village Hall. On April 21 there will be a bluebell walk in Blakes Wood. Meet in the car park at 10.30, with lunch afterwards. Pat Eden then read a letter from our twinned Institute in New Zealand saying how dreadful the earthquake in Christchurch had been, and how grateful they were for all the international help they had received including a team of firefighters from Essex who had gone out to help in the rescue work.

The Secretary read out the correspondence including a visit to Titsey Place in July, a walk at Hatfield Broad Oak and an order form for the 2011 crossword. The Treasurer said storage of some of our larger items was getting to be a problem and the Committee had been looking into getting a cupboard on wheels that could be stored in the hall, and asked members to think about various alternatives. The Flower of the Month was won by Celia Kerslake and the next meeting will be on April 14th, and will be the Spring Dhow, and schedules were available.

This year we had a 'sell out' in the village hall with 98 people squeezing in.

## **Ali Baba and the Forty Thieves**

One of the most traditional of pantomimes, the story is based on the hero of a tale in the Arabian Nights Entertainments - a series of ancient Oriental tales probably of 14th or 15th century origin.

But what a pantomime! A new writer for me and a witty first-rate script was well interpreted by the producer and cast of sixteen. Strings of pantomime-type jokes were delivered throughout with aplomb and had the capacity audience in 'stitches'.

Many of the players are now experienced and confident. Sophie Cooper as Mustapha Screwloose and Sebastian Pountney as Asbad - leader of the 40 thieves - had excellent stage presence. The latter had the audience rolling in the aisles with his disguised performance as the oil Sheikh 'Shake my Shammy' - or should that be Sheikh m'a Chamois? Laurence Green as Fatima Fandango was a typical panto. Dame, sang well and had an impressive level of audience control.

For me one of the best performances came from Nicola Mori as the archetypal evil spirit Alsatia and she interestingly doubled up as the crown prince Haroun. One would never have known. Her opposite number - Sarah Diwell played the feline Good Spirit in an appropriately quiet and gentle style.

Costumes at SAYF are always good but this year they were sparkling and appropriately varied. Similarly the scenery was beautifully crafted and as for the animated life-size camel! - I think that we all wanted one!!

It was encouraging to see talented performances from some younger cast members. Maddie Warner-Lodge as Princess Jasmine and her two maids showed enthusiastic promise while Matt Diwell and Emily Flack made competent scoundrels - roles that were not easy.

The scenes merged seamlessly in this well-oiled performance due in no small part to the efforts of Charlotte Dack (Grand Vizier) Jessica Bailey (Slavegirl) Ella Cooper (Scheherazade), Poppy Quay Watkins (Sultan) and of course the excellent Jade Cooper who played the eponymous Ali Baba.

All in all an excellent evening's entertainment. First class technical work from the lighting team; accurate, tuneful and sympathetic playing from the four-piece band and well rehearsed singing and dancing by the chorus/thieves played by Harvey Cooper and members of the cast.

That we went home happy is a result of the talent and enthusiasm of this young cast but also of the dedication and effort of the production team.

## **HOLY WEEK**

### **SPY WEDNESDAY**

This day in Holy Week, the conspiracy to arrest Jesus formulates as Judas Iscariot agrees to betray Jesus. "'What will you give me if I deliver him to you?' And they paid him 30 pieces of silver. And from that moment he sought an opportunity to betray Jesus" (Matthew 26, 15-16). In Ireland today is referred to as Spy Wednesday

### **MAUNDY THURSDAY**

This takes its name from the opening word of the evening Mass in its Latin Translation: *Mandatum novum do vobis* - I give you a new commandment (John 13, 34). Lent ends today, not on Easter Day. The last act of Lent is the Chrism Mass in most Cathedrals on Maundy Thursday, when the Bishop blesses the oils which will be used in the sacraments in the diocese, and the priests renew their priestly promises. Lent has built up to the Triduum, a name from the Latin for three days. On this first day we mark Jesus's commission to the apostles to "love one another as I have loved you". At the evening Mass many churches will recall Jesus' act of washing the feet of his disciples or hold an Upper Room Service around a table. This celebrates the institution of the Eucharist and the Priesthood. The practice of the Sovereign giving the Royal Maundy or Maundy Money is centuries old. Special coins are minted and given to older men and women, the number of whom is determined by the Sovereign's age. Again this recalls Jesus' commission: "Love one another as I have loved you."

### **GOOD FRIDAY**

On this day, when we mark the Lord's death for our sake, we do not celebrate Mass, which represents that saving act. Instead we gather to listen to the account of the Lord's Passion from John's Gospel, to pray for the needs of the Church and the world, and to venerate the cross. Calling it "Good" Friday may seem strange, since we mark the brutal execution of our Lord Jesus Christ. It is an Old English way of saying that it is holy. We change our lifestyle today so that our bodies mark this day as well as our minds and hearts. Hot Cross buns were traditionally served made from the same flour that was used to make the Mass hosts.

### **HOLY SATURDAY**

The earth is still, and Jesus lies in the tomb. On this day, the sacraments are not celebrated: no baptisms or marriages or funerals. Holy Communion is only given to the dying. -We wait...

### **EASTER DAY**

Today is the Lord's rising day: the empty tomb a testament to God's confounding of people's expectations. Christ has been raised from the dead, as the first fruits of all who have fallen asleep. This is the greatest day in the Christian calendar, and every day in the next week is treated as though Easter Day. Away the austerity of Lent! This is a time of celebration. Easter is calculated as the Sunday after the first full moon in spring. The name 'Easter' comes from the old pagan goddess of fertility, Eostre, who was celebrated about this time. In Romance-language countries, e.g. France, Spain and Italy, the term for Easter is more usually derived from the word for Passover, the Jewish festival of which the Scriptures speak in the Gospel narrative of the Passion and Death of our Lord.
