#### **Farming Today**

The family appreciated the cooperation of the Crown and residents of Hall Lane when moving harvest equipment through the village. Thank you.

Perfect weather for the harvest this year, although as I write, there is still 300 acres of Spring Barley to cut which normally yields a lot lighter than winter sown crops.

Eight new rams have been purchased, 3 Suffolk rams (with all black heads) and 5 Dutch Texels (with white flat faces). These will join the 360 ewes at the beginning of September. They will run with the ewes for 4 weeks. The Teaser Rams (castrated males) run with the ewes beforehand in order to bring them into season. Lambing will start again in early February 2025.

The 3 students, from New Zealand, Cornwall and Danbury, are all excellent. We very much hope the local boy with ex-Writtle qualifications will stay with us indefinitely.

Kelly free-range turkeys have been released into the woodland; 2000 white birds for Cooks and 1000 black birds for the Christmas market. Gillian

#### **Letter from the Wardens**

Often we can get cover designs and other material from a website called Parish Pump which provides material for local parish magazines up and down the country. The cover design for this edition is no exception. But it has triggered a thought: there are many names and descriptions of God. And in the second part of the first chapter of the gospel according to John (John 1:29-51) we have 7 words or phrases that describe God. They are Lamb of God, Son of God, Rabbi, Messiah, Jesus of Nazareth, King of Israel and finally Son of Man. We can get the idea that, and quoting from the Bible Project, "The fully human Jesus from Nazareth is the messianic King and teacher of Israel and the Son of God who will die for the sins of the world."

That message remains and it is our prayer that we as a church, along with other churches, will be able to proclaim it and grow in confidence in that message. We have been enormously appreciative of the support that we have received as we begin a period without an ordained minister. A vacancy as it is called. Interregnum is Latin for between 'rulers' but since we don't like to think of the minister as a ruler the word vacancy gets used instead!

We are grateful that Rev Carol Ball has agreed to help frequently on Tuesday mornings, for the 9:30 am service, and Rev Canon Hugh Dibbens to teach the first Sunday of the month - please see the notice on page 17. Revs Andrew Merchant, Jacqui Pearson and Jacqui Jones have supported the worship on Tuesday mornings too. Revd Sandy Southee gave us our first Sunday Communion after Terry's retirement and Rev Dr Jonathan Holmes has come all the way from Cambridge where he is former Dean of our patrons Queens' College. But in terms of distance he was outdone by Bishop Rob Martin who presided on 21st July as well as told us something of his visit to Marsabit in Kenya earlier in the year. Bishop Rob drove here from Somerset! We are delighted too that Bishop

We are delighted too that Bishop Adam, Bishop of Bradwell has agreed to preside at our service on Christmas Day.

We have also been planning ahead and aim to remember the lives of those who have died in the Time to Remember service (as we have had in recent years). Revd Geoffrey Griggs has agreed to lead that service.

We look forward to celebrating our patronal festival on 29<sup>th</sup>

November and hope to have a

time teaching children, possibly related to Creationtide, during half term on October 29<sup>th</sup>at 2pm. We have spent some time emailing various people and discussing the future with the Diocese of Chelmsford. Although it can seem as though that is a slow process, it must be quicker than getting permission for 180 km of pylons! That being said, we are still moving on. A further meeting in September has been arranged with Archdeacon Jonathan Croucher to continue planning a long-term way forward.

We have been meeting in the church for Morning Prayer at 8:30 am each morning since before Terry retired. The aim. once we started, was one hundred days which was completed on the 8<sup>th</sup> August. We were trepidatious at the start. However it works. Prayer has drawn us closer together and closer to God. We have prayed and we have thanked God for answers to prayer. We will continue, though maybe not in quite the same form, into the future. Sandon church and our whole world needs faithful prayer. Bishop Guli advises us that clergy need two clear days off each week so we too will be adjusting and only meeting from Sunday to Thursday for prayer each week. We are sure that this will develop

further as time goes on.

And thank you for the support of so many.



#### **30 Years Since The Chiropractors Act**

I graduated from Palmer College of Chiropractic in the USA in 1970. I met many students from countries where chiropractic was a registered profession and I had similar hopes for chiropractic in Britain. I started my Chelmsford practice in 1971 and in 1979 took over a practice in London. Most of the work outlined below was after the formation of the British Chiropractic Association (BCA) Parliamentary Committee, which I chaired and took place while I was President or Vice President of the BCA.

It would not have been possible without the help of my wife Michele and other chiropractors, and staff, working in Chelmsford Chiropractic Clinic.

The Chelmsford practice was one of eleven centres for a Medical Research Council (MRC) trial that very favourably compared chiropractic with hospital outpatient treatment for back pain. I appeared on BBC TV news when the results were announced in 1990.

Patient contacts led to many radio and TV appearances over the years, and they also helped with

progress towards the Chiropractors Act.



In 1983 The Prince of Wales, as Honorary President of the British Medical Association (BMA), referred to "long neglected complementary methods of medicine" in their 150<sup>th</sup> year anniversary address. This was widely reported in the news and led to "The BMA Inquiry into Alternative Medicine" and initiated talks amongst the main branches of complementary medicine. As a result. the Council for Alternative Medicine (CAM) was formed. I spoke with former Prime Minister Lord Home at the launch.

In 1983/84 I met two noteworthy persons at dinner parties, held by the Prince of Wales, who were to help over the years, Lord

Kindersley and Sir James Watt. Sir James, as President of the Royal Society of Medicine (RSM) initiated a series of 8 Colloquia (discussions) on Conventional and Complementary Medicine: Prince Charles attended three of these. Lord Kindersley and I were lay members of the RSM planning committee for these Colloquia.

Meanwhile, the osteopaths were making great strides towards statutory regulation and Simon Fielding was working full-time towards gaining regulation for osteopaths. I realised we needed to "strike when the iron was hot" and The British Chiropractic Association (BCA) agreed for me to undertake paid work on a parttime basis. Once I had sold the London practice, I was able to spend time on a very important and challenging task, which was time-sensitive, as there was an opportunity to follow the osteopaths on the path to statutory regulation. They were a much larger profession in the UK.

Peter Ediss from the Department of Health set out three necessary requirements: Support from ALL chiropractors.
Support from the medical profession.
A report from a reputable body recommending statutory regulation.

He also advised that legislation would need to be via a Private Member's Bill.

I approached the British Medical Association (BMA) who were not helpful and was advised by Sir James Watt to focus on the Royal Colleges. Lord Kindersley, with Sir James Watt's help, hosted a dinner party at the Royal Society of Medicine. The General Medical Council (GMC) as well as all the Royal Colleges were represented. This was most successful and was the most important part of the campaign, as the support of the medical profession was vital.

Earlier I met with Robert Maxwell of the King's Fund and Simon Fielding (osteopath).
Chiropractors agreed to support an Osteopaths Private Member's Bill provided the osteopaths would support a chiropractic one to follow.

We followed the osteopaths with a King's Fund Working Party on Chiropractic (KFWPC) which was chaired by the Hon. Sir Thomas Bingham. The eventual launch of the KFWPC Report was on 5<sup>th</sup> May 1993. It was attended by Diana, the Princess of Wales and I had the pleasure of introducing her to people attending. Due to her presence, there was widespread coverage in 6

National newspapers, TV and radio along with favourable comments from the main medical bodies.

David Lidington agreed with me to introduce a Private Member's Bill. Tony Newton, my local MP, who had advised throughout, had helpfully taken David out for lunch the day before. Lord Walton, formerly President of the GMC. BMA and RSM, who had also helped throughout, successfully piloted the Chiropractors Bill through the House of Lords. Royal Assent was on 5<sup>th</sup> July 1994, 30 years ago. Since then, no other complementary medicine practitioners have achieved statutory regulation. My main ambition for chiropractors in Britain had finally been achieved.

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#### Joan and Luke Bridger

Some years ago as we came to church each week there would be prayers said, amongst many other things, for Luke Bridger.

On 13<sup>th</sup> October 2001, Luke died as a young boy, aged 11, from a rare disease called A-T. You can see that it is called A-T because that is an abbreviation for ataxiatelangiectasia. It is a life limiting condition that is inherited. We did not know Luke. But his mother. Joan, did come to church quite regularly. She had lived in the parish but sadly her marriage did not survive the loss of Luke. She moved to South Woodham Ferrers but continued to support Sandon and the church. She was big on Teddy Tombolas and Jumble Sales.

Some years ago, Joan was diagnosed with lung cancer. She continued to come to church but when I last saw her, she was hitched to a mobile oxygen concentrator.

At the end of May Judy and I attended her funeral in Sandon church. She was buried with Luke in the church yard. It was Revd Terry's Brown's last funeral at Sandon.

Shortly before the start of the service a couple appeared whom we did not know. They sat near us and we lent and then gave them our order of service.

We asked how they knew Joan and they said that they had been trustees with her. We asked what organisation that was with. It turned out to be the A-T society. The service was clearly very moving for this couple, Vincent and Maureen. They had come from Hertfordshire.

It transpired that two of their four children had died with A-T in their teens. This is a rare condition. It is estimated that there are about 200 people with it in the UK. It seems to be a recessive gene and so only appears if both parents carry the gene and then, statistically, in just one in four cases. The symptoms are difficult to be precise about and include a wide variety of different things.

Vincent writes, "The A-T Society was founded, initially as a trust, in 1989 ,to bring together families affected by the rare genetic condition Ataxia-telangiectasia ("A-T"). We incorporated in 2004. The Society started because Birmingham University (Department of Cancer Studies) had commissioned a physician to collect blood samples of known cases of A-T. Maureen asked that doctor, who took samples from our Gregory and Caroline, if he

would be able to provide the contact details of others whom he was visiting. He very kindly did that, in those days this was not an issue. From there 10 families met at a hospice in Birmingham and decided to come together as a support group. Both Maureen and I were trustees until 2012, with me as treasurer and Maureen effectively running the charity. Joan was also a trustee for several years and was a very successful fundraiser. "Initially, all the early trustees were either parents of children with A-T or young adults with the condition. However, there comes a time when it is appropriate to broaden the skill set and welcome others with fresh ideas. That is what progressively has happened. We hired staff and recruited trustees from a wider talent pool. A couple of years ago, the Society put out a call for new trustees and Rachel .our daughter together with others, responded."

Joan was always positive and smiling despite the difficulties she encountered. At her funeral a display of photos was shown. Some thought the most memorable was Joan with two friends each side lined up in swimsuits doing handstands! Compiled by Richard Cecil

### Tales of Model Trains and Childhood - Part 2

My last article left you with the following questions about model railways and what happened next: Where did it go from there? How did things develop? Is there a happy/memorable end to the story?

Happily, throughout my childhood I was provided with a selection of models to make up, usually at Christmas, to keep my brother and I quiet after dinner while everyone else was allegedly watching the ballet on the TV but were in reality in the land of nod! The models were usually plastic and, at least to start with. sometimes melted thanks to the use of too much glue. However, I inevitably got the modelling bug which has not only fed into my model trains obsession, but has also led to a house full of wooden sailing ships that I have constructed from time to time.









To return to model railways. When we lived in Tilbury the model railway was often across the floor as was our son's Brio set. No circuits of rail for him. A layout had to have a beginning and an end. It generally seems to be London to York or Edinburgh.

Both in Tilbury and in Baddow, where we now live, the model trains were too big for the house, so a big trade-in happened. Stephen, our son, was easily persuaded of the advantage of trying N gauge. (N gauge is much smaller than OO gauge. The width between the rails is 9 and 16.5 mm and scale 1:160 and 1:72 respectively.) In our house we now have an N gauge layout, which has developed over the last 20 years with a short gap, when it had to be dismantled because we needed an extra bedroom.

The configuration upstairs is now two bedrooms and a train room. In terms of the railway, we are a bit odd. Most model railway enthusiasts model a layout on a particular area. Ours has just happened! Most also pick a particular era. However, I collect model steam locos, but my son is fixated on diesels and electric locos. I recall one memorable holiday when he was pretty small and managed to talk his way into the cab of an intercity loco while it

was stopped at Newark!
Inevitably, as well as Stephen and
I having a selection of rolling
stock, Catherine also has several
locomotives on the layout.
Nothing like a perfect birthday
present!

The one small problem with a train room, or maybe it's not a problem at all, is that it can never be decorated. The railway is attached to the walls. To even open or close the curtains needs a long stick.

Is this a memorable ending? It can't be because a model railway is never finished, especially when you have a father-in-law, who also has one, and likes to challenge me to find a place for yet another model building that he has scratch built in N gauge even though he models in OO!

The best way to see where we are up to is with a few pictures as promised last time. Is this all about childhood? Well, no, but that's certainly where it all started and it continues bringing out my inner child all the time.

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#### Is God on Mute?

2024 has not been a good year health wise for me. I spent New Year in hospital with abdominal pains and off work for six weeks. Then, on the night of Terry's retirement, I started having breathing problems. As an asthmatic, the Doctors and myself naturally assumed it was that and treated me for it. However, I just was not getting any better. Some days, but particularly nights, were very scary. I simply could not stop coughing and then could not breathe. One particular night I sat up all night in the lounge and the thought occurred to me that I may just stop breathing and would never see my family again. I knew God was there but was not hearing him.

The next morning, Richard Cecil messaged me to see how I was and told me that although I was too poorly to come to church, I could join Morning Prayer via WhatsApp. I had not realised that St Andrew's was running a Morning Prayer. At 08:30 am each morning, Judy and Richard Cecil, Andy and Cathie Horne, meet at church. It was lovely to be invited along at just the point in my life when I felt I needed prayer the most. After further investigations, it turned out that what I had was not asthma but Bordetella

Pertussis virus, or more commonly known as Whooping Cough!

For me, Morning Prayer has been literally a God-Send. I've been accessing it mainly from my settee, as still too unwell to be at Church that time of morning after a poor night's sleep. It has given me the opportunity to not only pray for whatever is on my mind that morning, to listen to each others prayers, but also to read and try to understand verses from The Bible. Quite often, after Morning Prayer has finished, we chat together and dissect what we have read or take something positive from what we have heard, and take that into the coming day. It is truly a beautiful thing and has got me through some really dark times. As my recovery journey is taking rather a long time, apparently that is normal for Whooping Cough, I have been able to continue with my morning prayers and will continue to do so going forward. What a lovely start to the day!

Morning Prayer is open to everyone in St Andrew's Church. It starts each morning (now just Sunday to Thursday) at 08:30 am and I am sure that either Richard, Judy, Andy or Cathie will be able to accommodate a phone call if you would like to attend but for

whatever reason are unable to. Please speak to one of them or attend church in person. They would love to see you. Enjoy your daily journey with God.

So, is God on Mute? Never, he is always there but sometimes you need space and time to listen.

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#### **Environmental Lifestyle Survey 2024**

Huge thanks to the 17 people who completed a lifestyle survey earlier this year. We thought you would be interested to see how we are doing as an Eco Church (really well – we achieved a silver award!). We also hope if you answered "no" to any of the questions, that they made you pause for thought about your plans for the future.

#### Results

- 100% of us answered "yes" to considering our lifestyle as part of living out our Christian faith.
- 65% of us regularly or sometimes walk or cycle to church services and events.
- Given that a good number of our congregation come from outside the village, this is a great result.
- 82% of us try to reduce our car use when possible.
- Only 35% of us have completed our personal carbon footprint this year. Would you like to do this? Do you need help with doing this? We have some information which will be available on a printed leaflet at

the back of church and on the church website.

- 94% of us limit our waste by adhering to the principles of reduce, re-use or recycle.
- 64% said "yes" or "sometimes" to purchasing Fairtrade goods where possible.
- 59% of us have renewable electricity at home.
- 88% of us have reviewed and made changes to our diet to be healthier and more

sustainable (eg less meat).

 88% of us purchase ethically where possible (eg check source of products, buy for less packaging).

answered "yes" or "sometimes" to using the LOAF principles (Locally grown, Organic, Animalfriendly, Fairtrade) when buying food.

• 65% of us

- 53% answered "yes" or "sometimes" to considering where we put our money by using ethical banking, savings accounts and/or investments.
- 47% of us participate in other community activity with an eco agenda (eg litter picking).

We then asked which **church activities** helped and supported you in living a more environmentally friendly lifestyle.

The top answers to this were the weekly email (14): sharing ideas with others (11); recycling facilities (9) and sermons (9).

## The **other resources** people found helpful are:

- Recycling facilities at home, work and council run; buying carefully and locally; media, internet; books; - 'How bad are bananas' by M Berners-Lee; using ecologically sound ways to grow food and maintain gardens; TV; church magazine; parish leaflets; talks about creation at Bradwell, St Peter's chapel; using water butts; making own compost.
- Using alternatives to chemical cleaners - white vinegar, bicarbonate, citric acid.
- Joined eco-church group; use a plot of church land to grow flowers; use toilet brush regularly to reduce need for use of products; recycle old clothes; recycle wherever possible; cut down on disposable items; develop a wild area in the garden, sow wildflower seeds, let grass grow.

The **future plans** mentioned by people include:

Continue with the same and also recycle pens; contact lenses; blister packs; crisp packs, sponsor endangered animals; local litter picks; use electric bike when possible; use less plastics; check out ethical banking; local area for wildlife and insects; natural methods for working the garden, allotment and house; check sustainability when buying groceries.

Other comments offered were: buy second hand, turn lights off, good weekly email tips.

#### Conclusion

These results are a positive continuation to our eco journey. Having gained a sliver award this gives us a good starting point as we progress towards gold.

#### **Next steps**

Come and join us to find out more about eco-church and help St Andrew's go for gold.

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#### **Coconut Apricot Flan**

Ingredients:

1 sheet of ready rolled puff pastry, 175 ml good quality apricot jam, 2 eggs,

120 ml cup sugar,475 ml desiccated coconut,15 g butter, melted.

#### Method:

Line a 20cm round flan dish with the pastry and trim any overlap with a sharp knife.

Warm the jam in a saucepan just enough to make it runny. You can choose whether or not to sieve the jam. Brush the base of the pastry with half of the jam.

Beat the eggs until thick, add the

sugar and beat again until thick and creamy, stir in the coconut and melted butter.


Spread evenly over the jam and bake at 150 degrees for about 30 minutes until golden brown.

Brush the top with the remaining jam while still hot.

Serve warm with cream or ice cream.
